Legacy BHS Awarded CCBHC Grant

LBHS is pleased to announce that we have been awarded the SAMSHA FY23 Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHC) Planning, Development, and Implementation Grant to establish a Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHC) in Lowndes County.

The CCBHC model is an outpatient, integrated care model that incorporates care coordination and utilizes a cost-based payment methodology. CCBHC clinics are required to provide a set of nine comprehensive services, in accordance with the federal criteria provided by SAMHSA. The CCBHC model integrates primary care screenings and substance use disorder care into mental health care settings clinically, financially, administratively. CCBHCs are required to serve anyone who requests care for mental health or substance use, regardless of their ability to pay, place of residence, or age.

During this process to become certified CCBHC, LBHS will create new relationships as well as strengthen and formalize our existing relationships with the social service agencies and other providers within our community. This formal structure created by the CCBHC provider model will effectively lead community change efforts for improve care for individuals with mental health and substance use disorders.

Georgia Collaborative Administrative Services Organization (ASO) Review August 14-17, 2023

The Georgia Collaborative ASO facilitates the delivery of whole-health, person-centered and culturally sensitive supports and services to individual and their families throughout the state. The results of the reviews done represent the dedication of LBHS as an organization and its employees to our community.

Legacy Behavioral Health Services Crisis Stabilization Unit (CSU) underwent the ASO Review in August. The CSU provides non-hospital emergence services 24/7/365 or persons served of 18 and older with mental health, substance abuse (drug and alcohol), and co-occurring disorders. Services include assessment, triage, 24-hour temporary observations, and short-term crisis stabilization.
